

That night we slept in a bean field across from the barn. At midnight there was a downpour and high winds. By the morning 10 tents were either knocked down or flooded. The section of the beanfield where some 6 or 7 tents had been was completely flooded. The barn became a refugee camp. Scott Greason woke up sleeping on an air mattress floating on 4 inches of water. Jim Andrews woke up under a collapsed tent and advised partner Don West of their situation. Don replied (talking in his sleep) that "It doesn't matter, we'll stay dry under the tent." Salvage crews were sent out every minute to get gear from "disaster areas". Parts of a patrol mess kit were spotted "adrift". We had a big pile of personal gear to be claimed.

We did have some fun, though. We went deer trapping. In one trap we caught two red hounds. We sped through muddy roads, rocking back and forth in the big mud puddles. One truck nearly lost a tire! We also caught a few deer.

We went to see the largest tree in Alabama. It took 6 men to reach around it.

We had a campfire at 8:00, with initiations and a couple of skits. We had some card games going on.

We went during the night to see deer in a pick-up.

We had a devotional Sunday morning. Two awards were handed out. A trophy in the shape of a tent peg for the best father on the campout, Mr. [unclear] was handed out, a tractor wheel about a foot in diameter was given to the tractor driver, Mr.

We reached Tuscaloosa before noon and dropped people off at their homes, and some hung up the tents to dry.

## The Way To Travel

Destination: Moundville.

For someone in Tuscaloosa a trip to Moundville wouldn't necessarily be an adventuresome journey — that is, unless you were going by canoe down the Warrior River.

And that's exactly what a group of Tuscaloosans are doing this weekend.

Led by scoutmaster Charles Smith, 18 boys and four adults of Boy Scout Troop 10, sponsored by the Forest Lake Baptist Church, shoved off Friday afternoon from the vicinity of the downtown bridge for the first leg of the two-day trip.


The trip has been planned for many weeks in advance with preparations including extensive instruction in canoe handling and water safety with two practice runs.

In addition, the boys have received pointers from the Corps of Engineers on operation of the river's locks and on navigation of hazardous points in the river. W. R. Richardson, Reservoir Ranger from Demopolis, has been following the troop in a small outboard for an added measure of safety.

The Scouts spent Friday and Saturday nights on the river bank, cooking their own food and using sheets of polyethylene for shelter. The canoes are owned by the Black Warrior Council and are available to all Scout troops in the council area.

The group is slated to arrive sometime this morning at Moundville State Park boat landing to be met by parents and a special Scout bus for transportation back to Tuscaloosa—the easy way.

Scoutmaster Smith used the occasion to get in a recruiting plug. He said any boy 11 or older can come to the Forest Lake church any Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. and join the troop.






## Camp Horn '78'

## Troop 10 Scouts Re From Appalachian

Twenty-four members of Boy Scout Troop 10 returned recently from a nine-day trip through North Georgia and western South Carolina. The highlight of the trip was a 50-mile hike of the Appalachian Trail by 10 of the scouts and three adults.

The troop spent the first night at the U.S. Army Ranger Camp located 12 miles north of Dahlonega, Ga., once a booming gold mining area.

The following morning 24 scouts and six adults began hiking the trail. Two days later they arrived at Lake Winfield Scott for swimming and laundry duties.

THE NEXT day they split into two groups. Fourteen scouts and three adults boarded the troop bus, affectionately known as "The No Noc," and went to Myrtle Beach, S. C., and other points of interest along the Atlantic coast.

The other group continued on the trail for the next three days,

hiking a total of 35 miles. The two groups then rendezvoused at the Ranger camp near Dahlonega for the return to Tuscaloosa.

The only problem encountered along the trail was a yellow jacket nest that resulted in several boys getting stung.

AN INTERESTING "extra" received by the Scouts was a demonstration by Rangers of Hand-to-hand combat techniques. The Rangers also

demonstrated how to scale cliffs and transport equipment across ravines. Finally, the Scouts were shown a display of captured Viet Cong weapons and U.S. weapons.

Other trips made by Troop 10 earlier this year were to Vicksburg and Six Flags Over Georgia. The Scouts earned most of the money for the trips themselves.

Charles Smith is scoutmaster and the troop is sponsored by the Forest Lake Baptist Church.

" and what do you think he saw? Oh my gosh! Another mountain!!






